Things To Do:

☆ Around the City: Inside

Things To Watch Out For:

☆ Dehydration and altitude sickness

Denver is high desert, and it is very easy to get dried out. Bring plenty of water if hiking or biking. Drink generously!

Denver is really a mile high, and heading into the mountains you can gain another mile or (almost) two. The air is thinner, and until you acclimate (up to 30 days), this can cause fatigue and unusual clumsiness. Take it easy! Drink lots of water!

☆ Sunburn.

Denver's altitude means there is less atmosphere to mitigate the effects of the sun on the skin. Wear sunblock when outside for 10 minutes or more on all exposed skin surfaces. Wear a hat!

☆ Glare.

Glare from the sun on cars or directly to your windshield,

reflected from cars, or even reflections from the snow! Sunglasses are a must!

Temporary Lodging:

☆ There are 3 hotels currently within the Eruv boundary. Also, each synagogue has a hospitality committee to match guests to hosts. Make arrangements in advance for Shabbat key and comfort settings at the Extended Stay America and Staybridge Hotel.

☆ Denver's East Side Jewish community supports this community-binding boundary to permit observant Jews to more freely attend shul and visit on Shabbat. A map of the area currently enclosed is found on the reverse side.

Food:

☆ Aside from the large selection of Kosher foods available at local supermarkets King Soopers, Safeway, Sprouts, Trader Joe's, and Natural Grocers, Denver's East Side features Kosher dining: Fleishig: The East

Side Kosher Deli and the ASLI Mediterranean Grill. The Deli supplies both Kosher commodities and a meat restaurant, including ordering out. Milchig: Brooklyn Pizza provides kosher pizza and extended hours.

☆ Rosenberg's Kosher supplies local baked goods. It is open Friday and Sunday mornings. Only this one location is Kosher!

☆ Two Kashrut supervision organizations exist in Denver: the TRI-Sulom (Lion-Scroll and Raish-Mem) and the Va'ad Hakashrus of Denver (Scroll-K).


